How Firm a Foundation: Building a Foundation for Life Together

Eastertide blessings to you all! I pray that during this season of Resurrection hope, you have been feeling the love of God and the promise of new life that is all around us. I have discovered that this transitional season from rain to sun is my new favorite time of the year. Though I have had to take more Claritin than usual, the promise of a new bloom each day has been bringing me great joy. In the past few weeks, I cannot tell you how many times I have literally stopped to smell the roses and other fragrant beauties. Admittedly, my own backyard is still a work in progress, but my block is lined with rose bushes and irises and each of my days is made brighter when I am greeted by the native plant garden of Lincoln House, which is of course our main topic of the season.

We have embarked on a Capital Campaign to raise \$500,000 over the course of the next three years so that we can fix the foundation of Lincoln House and tithe 10% of all funds raised to yet-to-be determined work in the world. Though this campaign may not feel especially shiny or stimulating, I do think it is an opportunity to live into the fullness of who we are as a community. We are a people committed to living life

together and showing up to create beautiful, hospitable spaces. From coffee hour to receptions after Memorials, from worship to small group book studies, and from shared dinners in homes to dinners with the women of Village House, we are a people dedicated to extending hospitality and living life together.

We all know that in order for any of this to happen, we need loving hosts and welcoming physical spaces, which is why the Capital Campaign we have embarked on is so very important. In so many ways, Lincoln House is the center of our daily movements together. We meet to dream about new projects, to sit and pray with one another in suffering, to welcome and help folks make ends meet, and so much more. The stability of Lincoln House is integral to our ability to be hospitable to friends and strangers alike.

From the experiences of our shared life, then, we are sent into the world to witness to the love and peace of God, which is where the tithe comes in. My hope is that as we engage with this campaign, we will witness to what God is up to in our midst and in the world. We have an opportunity to create hospitable, kingdom-like spaces on our own grounds and out in the world. And I pray that as we discern how best to steward these mission dollars, we will be even more bound to God, to one another, and to whom God is creating us all to be.

Join our Capital Campaign to repair Lincoln House

Three years and multiple committees after Stone Church began looking at the maintenance needs of our buildings, the Session has authorized a \$500,000 capital campaign to repair Lincoln House and perform a major mission project.

According to Artik Art & Architecture, our consultants in the early stages of this project, the 90-plus-year-old building that houses our church offices and library has foundation damage as the result of drainage problems, tree roots and earthquakes. In addition, some windows need replacing to reduce heating and cooling costs and cosmetic repairs need to be made to some floors and walls.

The Session has also pledged 10% of our fundraising to a separate mission project and will ask for the congregation's input on how that money should be allocated.

The Capital Campaign Steering Committee created earlier this spring, composed of Emily and Jody Meacham, Fred Oliver and Julia Roberts, is directing the pledge drive to fund this work because it is beyond the scope of our annual budget.

The committee began collecting pledges in May from our members, to be fulfilled over a three-year period, and intends to wrap up the campaign June 23.

Although we know members' ability to pledge will vary widely, the \$500,000 goal is about the same as our annual budget. That means, based on our average annual pledge of about \$3,200, that an extra \$1,066 per year from each pledger would reach the goal.

Over the next few weeks, the committee is asking you to consider and make your pledge using one of the pledge cards on our website at www.stonechurch.org/capital-campaign. You can also find a list of frequently asked questions on the page.

Money raised beyond our goal will be allocated to the next two improvement projects prioritized by the Session: making the backyard entry to the Social Hall handicap accessible and landscaping the backyard into a functional and usable space for ourselves and our visitors.

Shopping for Milk...

We run to the market early in the morning to pick up milk for our kid's breakfast. No big deal and no risk. Our neighbor Alfredo did just that on March 8, only to be picked up by ICE agents and transferred to the immigrant detention center in Yuba City three hours from his wife and young daughter. Alfredo is still waiting for his hearing to begin fighting his legal case. We hope that 19 years in the country will help him be released to his family.

Because Alfredo's case is still pending, our Accompaniment Team needs to start planning for the support that will be needed in June, when their vehicle registrations are due, adding \$469. Please consider the gift you could give as we encircle this family with Christ's love and our support.

His wife, Alma, and their 11-year-old daughter are nervous for him and for their future. They have trouble sleeping, and worry about bills and food. How the daughter is doing in school troubles Alma's thoughts during the day. Calls to connect with Alfredo cost \$12 for 20 minutes, but they are crucial for the connection, hope and love each can communicate to the others.

The Stone Church Accompaniment Team and supporters have reduced a bit of the worry and stress for Alfredo and Alma. So far, we have raised donations and given the family \$2000 for April and \$2000 for May to cover their rent, monthly bills, food and telephone calls from Alfredo. We've been able to locate Spanish language therapy at no cost to Alma and one of our experienced teachers has begun tutoring the daughter so she can improve her reading skills.

The Honorable Zoe Lofgren, U.S. House of Representatives, CA-19

Zoe Lofgren has been a member of the United States House of

Representatives since 1995. She represents the 19th District of California, based in the "Capital of Silicon Valley," San Jose.

After graduating from Stanford, she attended Santa Clara University School of Law, graduating cum laude in 1975. While practicing and teaching immigration law, she was first elected to the San Jose Evergreen Community College Board in 1979. In 1980, she was elected to the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors where she served for 14 years. Following Congressman Don Edwards' retirement in 1994 after 32 years in Congress, Zoe was elected to the House of Representatives. She currently serves on the House Judiciary Committee, the House Science, Space and Technology Committee, and the Committee on House Administration.

As the Chair of the Subcommittee on Immigration and Citizenship, and a former immigration attorney and immigration law professor, Lofgren is recognized as an established champion of top-to-bottom immigration reform and a national leader in immigration policy. Lofgren is also known for her work on patent reform, copyright issues, digital rights, and net neutrality. Lofgren also

serves as Chair of the California Democratic Congressional Delegation.

Stone Church is fortunate to host Congresswoman Zoe Lofgren for a Town Hall meeting on Sunday July 21, at 11 AM. Stone Church itself lies right within Lofgren's district.

Mark your calendars; then, on meeting day, bring your questions and concerns. The possibilities are exciting!

Stone Church Women's Retreat 2019 "Opened the Eyes of our Hearts"

With inspiring and heartfelt leadership, Susan Martin, LMFT, guided the fifty-three participants of this year's Stone Church Women's Retreat, April 26 - 28, into a time of introspection, with challenging questions about our relationships with others and with God. At the beautiful St. Francis Retreat Center, located in the countryside of San Juan Bautista, we also had time to simply relax and commune with nature.

The topic for the weekend was *To Be Astonished* — *Opening the Eyes of the*

Heart. In Susan's words, the retreat provided "... a time and place set aside to develop our capacity for attentiveness. When our work, families, and other obligations seem to claim most of our attention, we might be living our lives unaware of the friendship being continually offered us. The Spirit, the light of Christ within, waiting to bring us home to our real self in redemptive love — can we dare again to hope, to awaken to astonishment?"

The culmination of Susan's program was a Saturday evening ritual where we "cast off" paper "shackles" labeled with the things that bring us astonishment and those that keep us from realizing our full real selves. At a

beautiful, candle-lit service, with inspiring music from Pam Hood, Stone's Taizé pianist, we considered how the "eyes of our hearts" had been opened.

The retreat

closed with a very special

Worship and Communion Service on Sunday morning, led by the Reverends Sammie Evans and Sharon LeClaire, that featured many "stations" — for offering prayers for countries in distress (using beautiful bulletin cover artwork from Lyn Johnson), for receiving a special personalized blessing, for receiving the Sacrament of Communion, and for lighting candles for our most heartfelt prayer requests.

Among the evaluation sheets returned was a very touching comment: "For a while, I was able to forget about the outside world."

Session Reports

Below is a summary of the Session Meeting in April 2019:

- Approved a congregational meeting for May 26 after worship, for the purpose of electing new Deacons and Elders.
- Approved the participation of twelve Stone Church youth in the 2019 Triennium at Purdue University this summer.
- Approved members of the full Capital Campaign Committee, and allocated money from the Capital Campaign fund for outreach activities related to the campaign coming this May.
- Approved, at long last, an updated privacy policy brought forward by P&A. Under this policy, primarily targeted towards the website, Stone Church will not post identifying information alongside photographs of minors. Anyone who wishes to prevent photographs of themselves or their children from being posted on church publications, including the website, should notify the church office.
- Approved a proposal from StoneWorks to use an existing fund, sourced from matching funds from local companies whose employees give to Stone Church, to continue donations to Synod General Mission at the same level as last year.
- Approved the job description for the temporary position of Vacation Church School Co-Director, carrying a \$250 stipend. The intent of this position is to support the Director and document the knowledge and expertise of the Director.

Committee Reports:

- **Nominating Committee** reports that both slates (Elders and Deacons) are completed, hooray!
- **Presbyterian Women** continues to sponsor outreach and empowerment events throughout the community. PW will continue to sell Mother's Day cards on the next few Sundays to benefit Lifted Spirits. Fair Trade sales are officially closed.
- **StoneWorks** is busily planning a Service Sunday, coming soon, on which multiple opportunities will be provided for members to actively go out in service to the community after worship.
- **Stephen Ministry** reports that four of our Stephen Leaders are involved in a local training opportunity, some teaching classes and some receiving training.
- **Worship** is in the middle of logistics for Holy Week, with lots of moving parts for all the different services.
- **Personnel and Administration** is helping Vivace Youth Chorus by renting them temporary office space in Room 4, downstairs, while they are in transition between spaces. Room 4 is primarily used for storage.



Village House Women's Shelter will be here in September 2019. Kate Wheatley and Maureen Searing will lead this year's team. They will have an informational meeting June 2nd after worship (Room 6 downstairs). Much of the leadership team is already in place; at this meeting they'll look at leadership assignments, fill the few remaining slots on the leadership team, and set additional meeting times; there are still many opportunities to volunteer and support this wonderful Shelter. Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over.


Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever.

IN MEMORIAM



The Reverend Charles W. Rawlings

Rev. Rawlings was a distinguished Presbyterian minister whose varied work, spanning seven decades, reflected profound commitment to social justice within the framework of the Gospel. He was born in Wheeling, West Virginia on February 10th, 1931 and died in Los Gatos, California on April 15, 2019 at the age of 88. A son of the Ohio River Valley, Reverend Rawlings attended Parkersburg High School and Marietta College and graduated with a Master of Divinity from Union Theological Seminary, where his studies with Paul Tillich and Reinhold Niebuhr fueled his life's work. He began his career in Pennsylvania as pastor of Jim Thorpe Church and Lehighon Presbyterian Church. A substantial portion of his career, from 1964-1989, was spent in Cleveland, Ohio, where Reverend Rawlings was a leader in the Civil Rights Movement, the Anti-war Movement, and economic justice initiatives in the wake of deindustrialization. He was instrumental in organizing Martin Luther King's visit to Cleveland for the first time and worked with him directly on several occasions (see photo). In Cleveland, he initiated interracial dialogue groups in 1964 and had many connections to other

civil rights leaders, including Bayard Rustin, Andrew Young, and Ralph Abernathy. He was attacked along with Rabbi Arthur Lelyveld, who was injured, during the voter registration drive in Hattiesburg, Mississippi; he was a leading figure in the negotiations to end the Hough riots in Cleveland. Reverend Rawlings participated in civil disobedience numerous times in the 1960's and 70s, including during the "move the gym" action on the site of the shootings at Kent State in 1978. Reverend Rawlings worked as the Executive Director of The Office of Religion and Race and in the late eighties became Executive Director of the New Jersey Council of Churches, where he initiated inter-

religious dialogue on the Middle East and worked on economic justice issues related to trucking and shipping in Newark. He later had other roles at the National Council of Churches and in time became Director of the Santa Clara County Council of Churches of California in 2009.

Politically engaged to the end, Reverend Rawlings was in the last year of his life teaching a class, Democracy at Risk, working on issues of homelessness and the housing crisis, participating in a green jobs initiative, Smart Yards, and was regularly publishing his blog, Public Liturgies. Reverend Rawlings is predeceased both by his wife, Joan McMillen Rawlings, and by his daughter Ann Haynes Rawlings. He is survived by his son Edward McMillen Rawlings and his partner, Loras Ronald Ojeda, his daughter Carol Rawlings Miller, his son-in-law, James Milton Miller, his grandson, Jack Rawlings Miller, and nephew, Alan Greer Rawlings.
